### A Message from our Chair, Emma Worskett.....

Firstly, I am very pleased to inform you that we have three new governors at Rusper. Catherine Pinder was voted on as Parent Governor, Simon Young agreed to join us as a coopted governor and Kim Wickens, who I am sure you all know, is our new staff governor. I would like to welcome



them all and thank them for coming aboard. These are exciting times at Rusper and it is great to have a full governing body. Recently however, we have decided to increase the number of governors that we have at Rusper to enable us to perform more effectively and already we have the possibility of someone coming through the Local Authority to fulfil this role. More about this in next term's newsletter.

The main areas of focus for governors this term, in line with the School Improvement Plan, are Maths for more able pupils across the school and Phonics in Key Stage 1 and Spelling in Key Stage 2. Governors have been making monitoring visits into school including book looks and learning walks to enable us to see that improvements are taking place in these particular areas and it is looking good. Teachers are working really hard to embed the new Phonics and Spelling interventions, for instance. Governors have seen some good evidence of progress in Phonics and in a recent book look there were certainly some signs of early impact from the Spelling intervention implemented earlier this term. It was lovely to see so many of you at the Phonics Workshop and it is great that so many of you have managed to attend the Family Phonics sessions.

Mr A still strives to drive the school forward with his continuing enthusiasm, relentless hard work and an abundance of new ideas. Governors have a very strong and open relationship with him and he always ensures we are well informed and kept up to date with all matters relating to the school.

We had a very positive visit from the Local Advisor from County. I was able to be part of this visit and it was very encouraging to hear the positive feedback from his learning walk around the school. He was very complimentary about support staff, teachers, children's behaviour for learning and the learning environment itself. He also discussed how the school can make sure it is clear on how to report progress in preparation for the next Ofsted visit.

We will be holding our Parent Forum for this term on Friday 31st March at 9.00am. Please come along and meet the governors and tell us how you think things are going at Rusper. We would also be interested in hearing your thoughts about how you would like to see the school in twelve months time. We would love to hear your



views and yes, as usual, there will be biscuits!

Here is some feedback from the last Parent Forum:

- Parents were not happy with the standard of hot school meals at Rusper, so this subject will be part of our parent survey in the summer term.
- There was a query regarding the fact that a parent had not been informed that their child was attending intervention programmes. Staff are working to improve communications re interventions.
- Parents were concerned about the last minute cancellation of school clubs. In the future, where possible, last minute cancellations will be avoided.
- Following on from a conversation about the Parent Notice Board outside, the intention is now for the present notice board to be moved to where parents will have easier access to it during drop off and pick up times.

## GOVERNORS IN ACTION I KS1 BOOK LOOK by Wayne Mott (Parent Governor)





Governors are regularly invited into school during the school day to observe lessons, talk with the children and look at all of the fabulous work being undertaken in their work books. We are always made to feel very welcome both by the children and staff. Our visits provide a valuable insight into how the school is continually trying to improve, how the school facilities are being used and how the school budget is being invested. In

one such recent visit, Catherine Pinder (our new Parent Governor) and I undertook a 'book look' led by Deputy Head and Literacy subject leader Ms Clarke. On this occasion we were looking at the impact of two newly introduced initiatives 'No Nonsense Spelling' and 'Song of Sounds'. I can report that both of these new initiatives have required funding, teacher training (during INSET days) and a considerable amount of preparation work outside of the school day. Both the staff and children have really hit the ground running with these new schemes and we can already see that there is a noticeable positive impact in workbooks. On behalf of the governing body, we are grateful to both the children and staff for allowing us to visit school. Keep up the good work!





GOVERNORS IN ACTION II GRUFFALO CLASS VISIT by Catherine Pinder (Parent Governor)

This term I was warmly welcomed in to a phonics session with Gruffalo class. It was fantastic to hear all the children confidently singing the 'Song of Sounds', complete with accompanying actions.



The classroom walls were filled with visual prompts, displaying colourful picture clues as well as the letters that form the sounds they are studying. The class were focusing on the letter S, singing about sizzling sausages, and practising forming the letter, "Starting at the snake's head, down and round to his tail."

The interactive white board was invaluable to the session, with the children volunteering to come and trace with their fingers to show the others what they could do. The children were keen to put their individual stamps on the proceedings, which resulted in the board being filled with a rainbow of S's and demonstrated that they all knew their way around this sophisticated technology! During the session, the children progressed on to blending the sounds they knew, to read and write some basic words.



As the children moved on to a well-earned playtime I chatted with Mrs Thompson who said that the song was not only a great method for engaging the children, but she believed it was accelerating the progress the children were making getting to grips with this early stage of reading and writing. There is no doubt that a lot of hard-work is going in to embedding 'the Song of Sounds' into KS1 and the results are very encouraging!

A key focus for safeguarding the children of Rusper School is road safety, as the road outside is becoming increasingly busy at the start and end of the school day. You may be aware that the council recently undertook a traffic survey through Rusper, which we hope will lead to lower speed restrictions through the village. Whilst we await the outcome of this, the governors are keen to gather your insight in to ways to improve the road safety as well as record and understand the type of safety incident occurring on the road. We have devised a short questionnaire which we hope will capture any road safety incidents

witnessed by anyone in the community. The questionnaire will be available to complete electronically over the internet, but also on paper available from the school office. We hope to form a working group of parents/carers who can then use this information to gain a better understanding of the problem and come up with some sensible options for making the road safer for our children. More details of how you can get involved and how to complete a questionnaire will be sent out from the office very soon.
